


FIRST FLOOR PLAN






SECOND FLOOR PLAN







Description

The Mills House is an eclectic, High Victorian style brick residence located at 507 North George Street, Rome, Oneida County. Situated on the west side of George Street several lots north of its intersection with West Thomas Street and five blocks north of Rome's city center, the two and one-half story, gable roofed brick residence is oriented with its principal elevation facing east. Set back from the street consistent with neighboring residences, the Mills House stands on a narrow lot that rises several feet above street level. The nominated property consists of the parcel at 507 North George Street containing the Mills House; there are no other structures located on the property (a carriage house formerly located at the northwest corner of the parcel was demolished at an undetermined date). The character of the surrounding neighborhood is residential, consisting of large houses built on streets extended north from Rome's downtown area during the period ca. 1875-1930.

In form and plan, the Mills House is rectanglular, with its gable end oriented toward the street. A hip roofed, square, brick kitchen wing extends from the rear (west) of the main block. The building's unusual structural system consists of a sawed timber frame sheathed with plank siding, the whole covered by a veneer of pressed brick. The overall structure rests upon a raised basement of rusticated limestone block laid random ashlar. A smooth stone water table surrounds the foundation and stone belt courses define the upper stories. Cross gables embellished with cross bracing and fretwork and tall, corbeled brick chimneys rise above a heavy molded and bracketed wood cornice defining the roofline. A two story wall bay and a secondary entrance characterize the south side of the residence. The asymmetrical massing of the principal (east) elevation incorporates a square corner tower with pyramidal slate roof. A raised, one story, bracketed wood porch with balustrade extends across the first story. Fenestration generally is regular and symmetrical, consisting of tall, rectangular window openings with cut stone sills containing double-hung sash. The triangular-arched window lintels exhibit Venetian Gothic stylistic influence in their polychrome cut stone facing. The molded entrance architrave contains a double-leaf door with glass transom and etched glass panels.

Organized around a side hall plan, the interior of the Mills House consists of formal rooms (parlors, dining room, library) entered through large panelled doors from the entrance hall along the north side of the building. A curved staircase provides access from the hall to the second-story bedrooms. Despite having been partitioned into several apartments in later years, the Mills House retains a high level of integrity in its design, materials and finishes: Original doors, window sash, molded architraves, baseboard and cove moldings, mantels, plaster walls and ceilings remain in most rooms throughout the building, and the later partition walls have been removed as part of the present rehabilitation program.

Statement of Significance

The Mills House at 507 North George Street is architecturally significant as a distinguished example of late Victorian eclectic residential architecture in Rome. Built in 1877 (perhaps on speculation), the two and one-half story, gable roofed Mills House was among the first dwellings built on North George Street, which became Rome's most fashionable residential avenue during the late Nineteenth century. Embodying the unusual construction method of a plank-on-frame structure covered by a veneer of pressed brick, the Mills House exhibits an eclectic mixture of High Victorian design and decorative elements, including Venetian Gothic, Queen Anne and Eastlake-inspired influences typical of the period of construction. The building at 507 North George Street incorporates a corner tower with pyramidal roof, a rusticated stone basement, a stone water table and belt courses, polychrome stone window lintels, intersecting gable roofs with decorative fretwork in the gable fields and a raised one story porch with bracketed posts. Built during a period of great economic growth and development in the city, the Mills House retains a high level of integrity, and is significant as a rare surviving example of its type, period and method of construction in Rome.

Located near the west-center of Oneida County, the City of Rome was incorporated in 1819. The vital water transportation routes of the Mohawk Valley and Wood Creek converging at the "Great Carrying Place" became the seat of a British fort and settlement during the colonial period. Rome grew and prospered with the opening of the first completed stretch of the Erie Canal just west of the city in 1819. As the south terminus of the Black River Canal as well as the junction point for several rail lines connecting to the New York Central after 1853, Rome achieved prominence as a hub of transportation, heavy industry and commerce by the middle of the Nineteenth century. A sustained wave of commercial, civic and residential building reflected Rome's newfound wealth and prosperity as the city expanded outward from its center after the Civil War.

Rome's most fashionable residences of the late Victorian era were erected along North George Street. Reflecting the architectural eclecticism popular during the period, the earliest residences incorporated design elements and decorative motifs drawn from Queen Anne, Eastlake and Venetian Gothic-inspired sources contained in pattern books and builders' guides of the period. Among the most prominent of local builders working from these sources was R. A. Putnam, who erected many notable structures in Rome between 1861 and 1900. As built by Putnam, the house at 507 North George Street is a distinguished example local example of eclectic, High Victorian residential design and construction. Embodying the picturesque, asymmetrical form and massing of the Queen Anne style, the Mills House is highlighted by fanciful, applied Venetian Gothic and Eastlake-derived ornament, most notably in its polychrome stone window lintels, gable-end fretwork, ornate molded cornice and bracketed front porch. likewise reflect the eclecticism of the era: these include molded, double-leaf entrance doors with etched glass panels, a turned stair balustrade, a panelled Gothic library, molded door and window architraves and angular wall bays. The Mills House is notable for the high level of integrity throughout, and is a rare extant example of its type and period in the City of Rome.

The house at 507 North George Street was built in 1877 on a lot purchased the previous year by Mary L. Mills (Mrs. J. Duane Mills). Because of its architectural similarities to a neighboring house on an adjacent lot, the building on the nominated property may have been one of two residences built on speculation at the time. The Mills House subsequently passed through a succession of urban middle-class owners until the mid-Twentieth century, as follows:

1877-1892--Mary L. Mills 1892-1912--Charles Rathbun 1912-1948--Howard C. Wiggins family

After 1948, the single-family residence was partitioned into several apartments. These alterations have largely been reversed in the present renovation of the Mills House, which has revealed and substantially returned the building to its original floorplan and historic finishes. As a highly intact example of the High Victorian eclectic aesthetic, the Mills House is an important architectural landmark in Rome that recalls the city's late Nineteenth century growth and development.
