Summary Paragraph

The Rome Residential Historic District is located within the city of Rome in the Central region of New York State. The city encompasses 75.66 square miles near the center of Oneida County. The nominated district is near the center point of the city and is a large roughly rectangular area tapered at its southern end and centered along North George Street, which extends northeast from the city's primary commercial core (West Liberty Street). The Rome Residential Historic District abuts the existing Gansevoort-Bellamy Historic District (NR listed in 1975), with both encompassing portions of the Rome Scenic and Historic Preservation District administered by the city of Rome. The nominated district encompasses the primary concentration of residential development in Rome beginning in the mid-nineteenth century and extending beyond the early twentieth century. The early village developed rapidly following the construction of the enlarged Erie Canal in the 1840s, was incorporated as a city in 1870, and experienced robust expansion fueled by local industry during its "Copper City" era around the turn of the twentieth century. As the city's population grew, more land was subdivided into residential lots, and the street grid expanded to either side of the northeasterly axis of North George Street. The nominated district's streets are arranged into a rough grid oriented on a northeast axis that is interrupted midway by a diagonal arterial street (Turin Street, an early road that was part of the Rome and Turin Plank Road from 1848-1855). The district is roughly bound by West Cedar Street to the North, North James Street to the east, West Liberty Street to the south, and North Madison Street to the west, with the east and west boundaries drawn to exclude areas characterized by significant loss of integrity and/or widespread commercial use conversion, and to exclude the Gansevoort-Bellamy Historic District. The district of 952 parcels includes 839 contributing primary buildings that are mostly single and multi-family residential buildings, with several complimentary religious buildings. The architecture reflects vernacular to high-style interpretations of many nineteenth and twentieth century styles including Federal, Greek Revival, Gothic Revival, Italianate, Second Empire, Stick, Queen Anne, Romanesque, Colonial Revival, Tudor Revival, Mission and Spanish Revival, Craftsman, Ranch, and Split-Level. Over two-thirds of the properties include a contributing outbuilding, mostly garages, numbering 358. The proposed district includes only 44 non-contributing primary and 79 noncontributing secondary buildings in reflection of its overall integrity.

Narrative Description

The Rome Residential Historic District is located near the center point of the city of Rome directly northeast of its primary commercial center, and adjacent to its municipal core (Gansevoort-Bellamy Historic District). Grade ascends roughly along the 1.4-mile northeast axis of the district from a low point of 450 feet above sea level at West Liberty Street to 475 feet above sea level at West Cedar Street. Nearly all parcels within the district are flat, with one of the few exceptions being the west portion of the 500 block of North George Street where several adjacent homes sit atop modest terraces.

South of Thomas Street, the district follows a regular grid plan based on an original grid of 400 x 600-foot blocks set on an approximate 33-degree eastward tilt (perpendicular to the former canal between the Mohawk River and Wood Creek) as initially laid out by William Weston ca.1800. The original 400 x 600-foot blocks are

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irregularly subdivided by alleys, some running north-south and some running east-west; alleys are named, and many of the district's garages, carriage houses, and secondary dwellings face the alleys. Some of the alleys in the original street grid design have been lost to subsequent subdivisions, but are still readily visible throughout the district, both in its older (southern) and newer (northern) sections. The original Weston lots measured 66 x 200 feet with only 210, 214, and 218 West Court Street retaining this dimension.

From Thomas Street to the north, the grid plan is less regular, reflecting the presence of some streets (like Turin Street, an early plank road) that predated surrounding subdivisions, as well as the varying ways in which residential developers obtained and subdivided land to accommodate population growth. The streets are still generally laid out in a grid, but with blocks varying in size, shape, and orientation.

Aside from some irregular lots at angled intersections and a few very grand residences, lots are typically rectangular, deeper than their widths, and vary from 30 to 140 feet. All streets and alleys are paved with asphalt with the streets defined by historic sandstone, concrete, and modern granite curbing with concrete sidewalks to either side. Tree lawns are typically narrow and planted irregularly with a variety of street trees, with those along North George Street and near the northern end of the district being the broadest and most heavily planted. Two public parks are located within the district with the oval Vogel Park interrupting North George Street between West Sycamore and Walnut Streets and Fort Stanwix Park, on the grounds of the former Rome Cemetery, at the eastern border of the district near its midpoint.

Most residential buildings within the district, whether built without a carriage house or before the advent of the automobile, continue to primarily use the system of alleys within the street grid for vehicular access, and so, driveways are quite rare. Existing carriage houses and garages typically face the alleyways and are often not readily visible from the street. Typically, only religious buildings and some of the grandest residences on North George and North Washington Streets make use of driveways with few exceptions, blocks where alleys were never provided.

Although front and side setback distances can vary from block to block, they typically remain uniform between adjacent buildings, with most residences sited on narrow lots with minimal side yards, except along North George Street and near the northern end of the district where lot widths tend to be broader. In general, front doors are located on primary elevations and face the street with dedicated walks leading out to the public sidewalk.

The development of the Rome Residential Historic District occurred over a period of a hundred and thirty years from ca. 1840 – ca. 1970, with the majority of buildings constructed in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century. This district therefore has excellent example of most of the styles and trends in American architecture from this period. The majority of buildings within the district were originally built as single-family residences. A small number of rowhouses, Boston flats, and other multi-family residences are interspersed. A handful of religious, educational, multi-unit apartment, and commercial (southern edge only) buildings were constructed throughout the district. Subsequent conversions of larger single-family residences into multi-family housing throughout the district and professional offices and private clubs in the southern portion of the district is common. Almost all religious buildings within the district were built as and remain active houses of worship.

Buildings within the district are mostly one-and-one-half, two, or two-and-one-half stories in height and have front-, side-, or cross-gabled, hipped, or mansard roofs. The apartment, educational, and commercial buildings typically have flat roofs concealed by parapets. The variety of lot sizes from subsequent subdivisions allow for a greater variety of scale and massing throughout the district with the largest lots and buildings typically appearing along North George Street and in the southeast portion of the district. The buildings within the

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proposed district incorporate a wide variety of modest to high-style interpretations of nineteenth- and twentieth-century styles, with the buildings becoming increasingly younger the further north they are located within the district. Greek Revival and Italianate are common south of Elm Street; Queen Anne, early Colonial Revival, and Craftsman are common in the middle portion of the district; Colonial, Tudor, and other period revival styles with infill ranches are common in the north section of the district.

The residential buildings within the district are mostly wood post-and-beam or frame construction commonly clad in wood clapboards or shingles, with brick, stone, and stucco masonry veneer common for twentieth century buildings in the northern half of the district. Substitute (vinyl, aluminum, or composite) siding is common especially on more modest homes in the southern half of the district. Earlier buildings typically have stone foundations, often parged, with concrete block foundations, commonly faced in brick, common for most twentieth century buildings. The multi-family residential, religious, educational, and commercial buildings are typically constructed of solid masonry with either brick or random-ashlar outer wythes.

STREETS

North George Street and North Washington Street

North Georg Street and North Washington Street both run north and south and are the main arteries through the nominated district. These streets were plated ca. 1848 by Calvert Comstock and George Huntington as large lots outside the city center for prosperous residential development. Lots between West Liberty Street and West Court Street are some of the earliest and tend to be smaller than the larger lots and grand houses further north from the mid to late nineteenth century. Between West Pine Street and Walnut Street, North George Street circles around Vogel Park and then becomes a divided street with a median showcasing mid twentieth century residences.

North James Street, West Linden Street, North Madison Street and West Thomas Street

In 1877 a horse drawn streetcar loop was established beginning in the commercial district on Dominick Street north along North James Street, west along West Linden Street, south along North Madison Street, east along West Thomas Street. Development of single family and multi-family housing along this route followed quickly.

Turin Street

Turin Street was an early plank road which the district developed around. Residential buildings are mainly on small lots and are a mixture of single family and multi family. Many of the lots are set at angles with the street, appearing to fill in space with the adjacent street grid plan.

West Liberty Street and West Park Street

West Liberty Street is southern border of the nominated district and just north of the urban renewal core of the commercial area around Dominick Street and Erie Boulevard. Churches and civic institutions are focused on this street just before entering the earliest section of the residential development. In 1914-24 a residential zone was established north of Park Street to stop any industrial or commercial development.

West Park Street, West Court Street, West Embargo Street

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West Park Street, West Court Street and West Embargo Street developed east to west from ca. 1850 through the early twentieth century. Lots on the east of the district boundary are on smaller lots and earlier styles of residences than those to west as the lots were developed.

West Garden Street, Maple Street, West Locust, West Pine Street, West Sycamore

Development north of West Garden Street, filled in lots from 1910s and 1920s. These lots were mainly sold and developed in small clusters by individual developers on medium size lots.

Walnut and West Oak Street

Between Walnut Street and West Cedar Street development slowed in the 1930s but gained momentum again in the 1950s-1960s. Lots show more of a suburban character including garages.

Alleys

There are many alleys perpendicular to the early development of the district from the mid nineteenth century to early twentieth century. These alleys are mainly north of West Thomas Street and this area was farther from the industrial and commercial core. Barnard Place and Floral Street are east and west of North Madison Street. Watersen Lane is in between Cherry Street and North George Street. Earl Street, Jeans Avenue, Paige Lane, Caire Lane and Kaskoun Lane go west to east from North Madison Street to North James Street. A couple of other alleys are interspersed going north and south between West Locust Street and West Cedar Street.

Integrity and Contributing / Non-contributing Determinations

Overall integrity in the district is high at a streetscape level, with few gaps or intrusions that post-date the period of significance. Most of the vacant lots in the district have either been historically empty lots or have been vacant for many years. The great majority of buildings in the district were constructed during the period of significance. Consistent streetscape features, such as concrete curbs and sidewalks, aprons / tree lawns, and mature trees contribute to the historic character of the district.

Common alterations to buildings in the district include removal of front porches, replacement of siding materials, and window replacement. A number of garages were built after the period of significance, as many of the houses in the district were built before automobile ownership was common.

Methodology

The following criteria were used to evaluate contributing/noncontributing status of buildings in the district.

• Date: The building must have been present during the period of significance. Buildings constructed after the end of the period of significance are noncontributing.

The building must retain, at a minimum, integrity of location, setting, feeling, and association.

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Location: Very few buildings in this district are known to have been moved. A building that was moved into or within the district during the period of significance, or within the district after the period of significance, retains integrity of location.

- Setting: District boundaries were drawn to encompass an area that maintains cohesion as a predominantly residential environment conveying Rome's growth and outward expansion; thus, all buildings retain integrity of setting.
- Association: All properties in the district that were built during the period of significance are associated with the growth and expansion of Rome and retain integrity of association.
- Feeling: In this district, properties retain integrity of feeling if they convey their historic character, which is generally tied to considerations of workmanship, materials, and designed, described below.

Integrity of workmanship and materials is important for a handful of buildings that display high-style architectural design. The majority of buildings are more modest in character; neither workmanship nor materials constitute essential aspects of integrity for these buildings, as long as alterations to workmanship and / or materials do not detract from integrity of design or feeling. Owners of typical houses in the district commonly sought to address maintenance issues using twentieth-century substitute materials marketed as being easier to maintain, such as composite, vinyl, or aluminum siding. These materials do not count against integrity if they do not significantly obscure the building's historic character.

Buildings in the district are considered to have integrity of design if they retain enough character-defining features that their historic design is substantially legible. The following considerations were used to evaluate integrity of design:

- The building should retain its historic scale and massing. Additions that are clearly secondary, e.g. located at the back or side where they are visually distinct from the historic form, are common and are considered part of the normal evolution of buildings in the neighborhood. Such additions do not detract from integrity.
- The building should retain its historic roofline. Alterations to the roofline during the period of significance are acceptable.
- Replacement sash in historic or slightly modified openings are common in the district and do not render a building non-contributing, nor do alterations to openings if the historic openings remain legible (e.g. partial wood infill of a window opening in a brick building). Extensive alteration to fenestration patterns due to complete infill of openings or introduction of new windows not consistent with the location, rhythm, operational type, and/or size of historic fenestration may render a building non-contributing. An isolated instance, or alterations to fenestration on less-prominent sides of the building, will not render a building non-contributing in the absence of other integrity issues.
- Alterations to historic front porches are common and are often a response to deterioration and/or the need for additional interior space. Few porches in the district retain all their historic materials, and some porches have been removed or infilled. Alterations to historic porches, up to and including removal, will not on their own render a building non-contributing. Replacement of a historic open front porch with an alternative not typical of the period of significance, such as an uncovered deck or

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a full enclosure that does not retain evidence of original open character, may alter the building enough that it is no longer contributing.

While one substantial change to a building in one of the categories described above can detract from integrity enough to render the building non-contributing, more commonly buildings are determined non-contributing due to the cumulative effect of multiple alterations that collectively obscure the building's historic character and detract from the continuity of the streetscape. Such substantial alterations can also detract from integrity of feeling.

Bissell Avenue – Even

418 Bissell Avenue ca. 1880s one contributing primary building

Two-story frame residence with rectangular footprint and gable roof. Parged foundation, vinyl siding and asphalt shingle roof. Facade is two bays wide with one-over-one replacement windows; wood cornice. One-bay entrance porch on the north side, obscured by board fence; porch has turned posts and decorative brackets. Appears on historic maps as an outbuilding associated with the house at 119 West Thomas Street; converted to a dwelling circa 1908.

Bissell Avenue - Odd

421 Bissell Avenue
ca. 1915
one contributing primary building

One and a half story frame residence with L-shaped footprint and side-gable roof. Rock-faced concrete block foundation, vinyl siding and asphalt shingle roof. Main section is two bays wide by two bays deep with one-over-one replacement windows. Two-bay, one-and-one-half-story wing extends to the south, set slightly back with one bay entrance porch on the corner formed by front and side wings, sheltering a single door. One-story shed-roof side addition on the south.

505 Bissell Avenue ca. 1870s one contributing primary building

One and a half story frame residence with rectangular footprint and gable roof. Parged foundation, vinyl siding and asphalt shingle roof. Facade is three bays wide, symmetrical with a central entrance flanked by one-over-

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one replacement windows. One-over-one replacement window centered above the door. Shed-roof side wing on the north elevation. Eaves and trim wrapped in vinyl.

507 Bissell Avenue ca. 1900 one contributing primary building

Two-story frame residence with rectangular footprint and gable roof. Parged foundation, aluminum siding and metal roof. Facade is two bays wide with entrance on the right sheltered by gable hood, one-over-one window with storms on the left; two one-over-one windows with storms on the second-floor. Smaller one-over-one window in gable. Vinyl soffits.

513 Bissell Avenue ca. 1880 one contributing primary building

Two-story frame residence with rectangular footprint and gable roof. Parged foundation, vinyl siding and asphalt shingle roof. Facade is three bays wide with an off-center door on the far left, two one-over-one windows with storms on the right, aligned with similar windows on the second story. Entrance door sheltered by shed roof hood.

Boulanger Lane

810 Boulanger Lane ca. 1920 one contributing secondary building

One and a half story, four and a half bay wide by two bay deep gambrel side-gable rectangular plan garage with brick foundation, walls, four vehicular door openings and asphalt shingle roofing. Garage for the residence at 802-804 North George Street.

Brush Avenue- Even

408 Brush Avenue vacant lot (not counted)

410-12 Brush Avenue ca. 1880 one contributing primary building

Two-story, six-bay wide by two-bay deep, side-gable rectangular plan double residence; symmetrical side-by-side double. Concealed foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and standing-seam metal roofing. Building features two one-story, one-bay entrance porches far left and right bays, with square wood columns and balustrades.

514 Brush Avenue

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ca. 1890

one contributing primary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep, gable rectangular plan residence with rubblestone and brick foundation, vinyl siding, primarily six over six double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features one-story, one-bay entrance porch with square wood columns and metal awning-style roof.

Brush Avenue- Odd

309 Brush Avenue ca. 1885 one contributing primary building

Two-story, two-bay wide by two-bay deep, gable L-plan residence with concealed foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features one-story, one-bay wing on the west elevation with entrance porch sheltering secondary door.

311 Brush Avenue vacant lot (not counted)

315 Brush Avenue vacant lot (not counted)

north of 315 Brush Avenue vacant lot (not counted)

Cherry Street-Even

700 Cherry Street ca. 1920 one non-contributing primary building (due to alterations)

Two and a half story, four-bay wide by two-bay deep side-gambrel rectangular plan residence with parged foundation, faux stone siding on the first floor and vinyl siding on the second floor and gable ends, primarily six over six double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Primary entrance in slightly projecting, gable vestibule with squat Palladian window above; two secondary entrances on the left sheltered by pent roof that extends across façade of attached garage. Two one-story, one-bay garage additions to the north; one-story, onebay enclosed sun porch with arched windows on the south.

704 Cherry Street ca.1920 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, two-bay wide by three-bay deep hipped roof rectangular plan residence with parged foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. One-

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story, one-bay projecting entrance door vestibule in the right bay; picture window with simulated muntin on the first floor left. Hipped dormers on the façade and south elevation.

706 Cherry Street ca. 1910 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, two-bay wide by three-bay deep hipped roof residence with rock-faced concrete block foundation, vinyl siding on the first floor and cedar shingle siding on upper floors, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl, casement wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. One-story, full-width entrance porch with solid rail clad in cedar shingles and wood Tuscan columns, sheltering off-center door with single window to the right and paired windows to the left. Gable dormer on the façade with three diamond-paned windows, tallest window in the center.

708 Cherry Street ca. 1910

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two and a half story, two-bay wide by three-bay deep hipped roof residence with rock-faced concrete block foundation, aluminum siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features one-story, two-bay entrance porch with solid wall and wood square columns. Gable dormer with triple window. Form and fenestration are identical to 706 Cherry Street; siding and porch columns have been altered.

Garage not visible from street, ca. 1920.

710 Cherry Street ca. 1910 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep hipped roof rectangular plan residence with rock-faced concrete block foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width entrance porch with wood square columns, piers and balustrades sheltering off-center door in slightly projecting vestibule. Gable dormer with single window.

712-14 Cherry Street ca. 1908 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, four-bay wide by four-bay deep rectangular plan residence with pyramidal hipped roof. Rubblestone foundation, composite siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features full-width entrance porch sheltering two doors in slightly projecting vestibule; porch has solid sided balustrade and wood Tuscan order columns. Gable dormer.

716 Cherry Street ca. 1925 one contributing primary building

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Two and a half story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep gable rectangular plan residence with panel-faced concrete block foundation, vinyl siding, primarily four over four and six over six double-hung vinyl windows occurring singly, in groups of three and asphalt shingle roofing. One-story, one-bay projecting entrance door vestibule in the center.

718 Cherry Street 1949

one contributing primary building

One-story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep side-gable rectangular plan residence with poured concrete foundation, vinyl siding, primarily eight over eight, six over six double-hung vinyl windows occurring singly and in pairs and asphalt shingle roofing. One-story, cross-gable projecting gable entrance door vestibule with square wood columns and balustrade; one-story bay window on the south elevation.

720 Cherry Street 1945

one contributing primary building

One and a half story, three-bay wide by two-bay deep cross-gable residence with poured concrete foundation, vinyl siding, vinyl windows in varied configuration (double-hung, horizontal sliders and picture), asphalt shingle roofing. Shed-roof hood sheltering center entrance door.

722 Cherry Street 1959

one contributing primary building

One and a half story, three-bay wide by two-bay deep cross-gable rectangular plan residence with poured concrete foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Entrance door in projecting gable wing sheltered by a simple gable entrance hood; small shed-roof addition left of entrance.

Cherry Street-Odd

701 Cherry Street ca. 1900 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, two-bay wide by three-bay deep cross-gable residence with random ashlar stone foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and standing seam metal roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with square wood columns, piers and balustrade sheltering door in the right bay.

One-story, gable roof garage with vinyl siding, ca. 1920.

709 Cherry Street

ca. 1910

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two and a half story, two-bay wide by two-bay deep gable rectangular plan residence with non-visible foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl sash windows occurring singly and in pairs and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with vinyl square columns, piers, sheltering an off-center door.

Gable-roof garage not visible from street, appears consistent with the style of the house, ca. 1910.

Full-width, one-story front porch with solid sided balustrade and square columns shelters two off-center front doors on the right, paired windows on the left.

715 Cherry Street

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ca. 1919

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by five-bay deep hipped roof cross-gable rectangular plan residence with parged foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with slender wood turned spindle balustrades and columns. Projecting right bay on the second floor over first-floor porch.

One-story, three-bay side-gable garage with vinyl siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1930.

717 Cherry Street ca. 1925

one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, two-bay wide by two-bay deep gable rectangular plan residence with quarry-face ashlar stone foundation, aluminum siding, primarily six over one double-hung wood, one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story, enclosed entrance porch with setback door flanked by banks of windows; one-story, one-bay shed-roof attached garage on the north.

719 Cherry Street

ca. 1860

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep shallow hipped roof linear plan residence with parged foundation, aluminum siding, primarily two over two double-hung wood windows and presumed rolled roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with brick piers, rounded columns and wood balustrade sheltering door on the left, picture window on the right. One-story, one-bay enclosed side entrance on the north, enclosed with plywood with second floor porch above.

One-story, two-bay gable roof garage with vinyl siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1930.

721 Cherry Street

1977

one non-contributing primary building (due to age), one non-contributing secondary building (due to age)

Two-story, two-bay wide by two-bay deep, side-gable rectangular plan residence with parged foundation, aluminum siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing.

One-story, two-bay gable roof garage with cove wood siding and asphalt shingle roof, ca. 1977.

723 Cherry Street

ca. 1900

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story, two-bay wide by two-bay deep side-gable rectangular plan residence with covered foundation, composite siding, primarily six over six double-hung vinyl windows and standing seam metal roofing. Full-width enclosed entrance porch low-pitched gable roof has door on the right, tall Palladian window on the left.

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One-story, one and a half bay gable roof garage with vinyl siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1920.

Two and a half story, two-bay wide by three-bay, cross gable rectangular plan residence with hipped roof. Rubblestone foundation, aluminum siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and composite shingle roofing. 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one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

One and a half story, two-bay wide by four-bay deep gable L-plan residence with parged foundation, composite shingle siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Entrance door is part of the one-story, cross-gable side wing.

One-story, one-bay gable roof garage with cove siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1930.

311 Curtis Street vacant lot (not counted)

Elm Street-Even

200 Elm Street ca. 1920 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, two-bay wide by four-bay deep gable rectangular plan residence with rock-faced concrete block foundation, clapboard siding on the first floor and wood shingle siding on second floor, primarily one over one double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with low-pitched gable roof, off-center door and banks of storm windows.

202 Elm Street ca. 1840 one contributing primary building

Building features two-story, three-bay entrance porch with square columns and balustrade on the first floor; second floor is completely enclosed with vinyl siding and vertically divided windows.

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story, two-bay wide by three-bay deep gable rectangular plan residence with parged foundation, wood shingle siding, primarily one over one double-hung windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story

Two-story, gable rectangular plan residence; main section of the house is three bays wide. Entrance porch with Tuscan order columns and square wood balustrade. Two-story broad bay window on façade and right section; one-story, one-bay side-gable addition on the west elevation.

One-story, two-bay gable roof garage with vinyl siding and standing seam metal roofing, ca. 1960.

216 Elm Street

ca. 1860

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep gable rectangular plan residence with parged foundation, vinyl siding, primarily six over six double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with square columns and wrought iron stair railing, sheltering door on the left and one-over-one windows center and right bays.

One and a half story, one-bay gable roof garage with side-gable addition on east, vinyl siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1920.

220 Elm Street

ca. 1870

one contributing primary building

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Two-story, three-bay wide residence with low-pitched hipped roof. Windows generally vinyl replacements in varied configurations. Primary façade has one-bay entrance porch on the left, bay window on the right; three one-over-one windows on the second-floor. One-story addition on the west, attached by open breezeway; addition has ribbon of windows just below eaves with metal awning. Telescoping additions to the north.

306 Elm Street ca. **1920**

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide residence with side-gable roof. Stone foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. One-story porch spans center and right bay and wraps east corner; porch has wood rail with square balusters and round wood columns. Windows generally six-over-one, mix of wood and replacement sash in various configurations including single, double and triple.

312 Elm Street ca. 1905

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep side-gable rectangular plan residence, symmetrical façade with random ashlar stone foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one, two over two double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width enclosed entrance porch, center door with sidelights and semi-elliptical fanlight, sheltered by projecting porch; entrance is flanked by porch windows with four-lite wood storms. Center oriel window above entrance with broad gable dormer. Open porch on east elevation has a geometric wood balustrade and simple round columns.

One-story garage, stucco exterior with hipped roof, exposed rafter tails, standing-seam metal roofing and vent cupola with finial, ca. 1910.

314 Elm Street ca. 1910

Foundation not visible; wood shingle siding, primarily six over six double-hung replacement windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Bay window on second-floor; Palladian window with decorative muntins in gable.

401 Elm Street ca. 1910

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep gable rectangular plan residence with rock-faced concrete block foundation, vinyl siding, mix of one over one double-hung wood cottage windows with aluminum storms and one over one double-hung vinyl replacement windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story, front porch with solid balustrade and fluted columns. Triple window in attic with decorative upper sash.

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One and a half story, one-bay gable roof garage with brick walls and vertical wood cladding at gable ends with standing-seam metal roofing, ca. 1910.

Elm Street-Odd

211 Elm Street

ca. 1890

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two and a half story, two-bay wide by two-bay deep cross-gable residence with quarry-face ashlar stone foundation, wood shingle siding, primarily one over one double-hung wood windows and standing seam metal roofing. Gable section on the right has narrow, tall proportions with a telescoping three-story bay window extending from foundation to roof. One-story porch in L formed by façade and east wing with fluted Ionic columns (two missing their capitals).

One and a half story, two-bay side-gable garage with two garage doors in gable projection, projecting gable roof, wood shingle siding and metal roofing panels, ca. 1910.

213 Elm Street ca. 1860 one contributing primary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep gable linear plan residence with ashlar stone foundation, composite shingle siding, primarily one over one double-hung replacement windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Offcenter door in right bay sheltered by small pent hood; evenly spaced façade windows have delicate flat hood molds. Wood raked cornice and molded fascia. One-story recessed entrance porch on the east; telescoping additions to the south.

303 Elm Street ca. 1900

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by two-bay deep cross-gable Queen Anne-style residence with complex footprint and roofline. Random ashlar stone foundation; clapboard and wood shingle siding; asphalt shingle roof. Windows generally two-over-two double-hung wood sash. Building features two-story round tower with conical roof on the left; one-story, two-bay entrance porch spans remainder of façade and extends past west elevation; porch has solid piers and Tuscan order columns and shelters paired center double doors. Diamondpaned window in gable. Side-gable wing on west elevation, one bay wide by one bay deep with two-story bay window in the gable end, shingled scroll detail in the eave, paired windows in gable.

One-story, two-bay side-gable garage with clapboard siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1900.

305 Elm Street

1906

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Two and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep, Queen Anne-style rectangular plan residence with complex footprint and roofline. Parged foundation, clapboard and wood shingle siding, primarily one over one double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with wrought iron balustrades, clapboard-sided piers and paired Tuscan order columns. Three-story tower with conical roof on the right corner. Block modillions in the eaves of main roof, porch and tower.

One and a half story, two-bay gable roof garage with clapboard and wood shingle siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca.1906.

307 Elm Street ca. 1908

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two and a half story, two-bay wide by three-bay deep side-gable rectangular plan residence with rubblestone foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with solid balustrade and Tuscan order columns, paired in the center and in groups of three on the corners. Bay window on the second-floor right bay; gable dormer with Palladian window. Scroll modillions in the eaves of main roof and dormer.

One-story, three-bay hipped roof garage with vinyl siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1920.

309 Elm Street ca. 1906 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, four-bay wide by three-bay deep cross-gable rectangular plan residence. Parged foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung windows and asphalt shingle roofing. One-story, one-bay entrance porch, off-center door with scrolled metal supports.

Fort Stanwix Park North

100 Fort Stanwix Park North ca. 1900 one contributing primary building

Two story, frame residence with rectangular footprint and side-gable roof. Stone foundation, wood clapboard siding and asphalt shingle roof. Facade is three bays wide with center door above which is a projecting polygonal second-floor bay topped by a closed-pediment gable. Entrance porch has wood rail with widely spaced spindles, flat entablature and simple wood columns; porch extends across right and center bays with pediment over center entrance. Windows in right and left bays are one-over-one double-hung sash with simple surrounds and hood molds. Gable-roof dormers on the north and south each contain paired six-over-one wood double-hung windows, matching similar windows in central gable.

102 Fort Stanwix Park North ca. 1910 one contributing primary building

(Expires 5/31/2012)

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Two-story frame residence with rectangular footprint and gable roof. Stucco (first floor) and wood shingle (second floor) exterior; asphalt shingle roof. Three bays wide with center door and one six-over-one window to either side; door and left window are in a shallow two-bay-wide bump-out beneath a broad gable overhang that spans the entire facade. Deck with modern railing extends across entire facade. Second-floor has bay window on the left, one six-over-one window on the right. Bank of three double-hung wood windows in gable, each with diamond-paned upper sash.

104 Fort Stanwix Park North ca. 1900 one contributing primary building

Two-story frame residence with rectangular footprint and gable roof. Parged foundation; wood clapboard siding; asphalt shingle roof. Façade is three bays wide and spanned by full-width entrance porch that has a wood rail with closely spaced wood spindles, simple columns and flat entablature. Center door with sidelights and semi-elliptical fanlight, bay window to right and double-hung window to the left. Center Palladian window on the second-floor with a bay window to the right and nine-over-one double-hung window to the left. Pair of six-over-one windows in the gable.

106 Fort Stanwix Park North ca. 1900 one contributing primary building

Two-story frame residence, square footprint and hipped roof; facade is three bays wide. Stone foundation; composite shingle siding; asphalt shingle roof. Hip-roof entrance porch across center and right bay has wood rail with square wood spindles and square posts. Facade is otherwise symmetrical and has central door with half-height sidelights, flanked by paired one-over-one windows. Second-floor has diminutive paired, diamondpane casement windows flanked by paired one-over-one windows. Center dormer with bank of three diamondpane wood windows and hipped roof.

108 Fort Stanwix Park North ca. 1900 one contributing primary building

Two-story frame residence with rectangular footprint and asymmetrical side-gable roof that extends lower on the facade than the rear. Stone foundation; vinyl siding; metal and asphalt shingle roofing. Single-story entrance porch beneath roof projection with metal roofing sheltering bay window on the left, door right of center and casement window on the right. Second-floor has two-bay dormer above the bay window and one-bay dormer on the right, both with gable roofs.

108 ½ Fort Stanwix Park North ca. 1910 one contributing primary building

Two-story frame residence with rectangular footprint and gable roof, situated to the rear of 108 Fort Stanwix Park and only partially visible. Vinyl siding; asphalt shingle roof. Partial-width, gable-roof entrance porch to the right shelters off-center door with cottage-style window, appears to have stained-glass upper sash to the left of the porch. Two off-center one-over-one windows on the second-floor; Palladian window in gable.

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110 Fort Stanwix Park North ca. 1908 one contributing primary building

Two-story frame residence, three bays wide by two bays deep with rectangular footprint and side-gable roof. Stone foundation; vinyl siding; asphalt shingle roof. Three-bay facade with enclosed, pent-roof porch across left and center bays; porch has vertical synthetic siding, two one-over-one windows, entrance on the left sheltered by pent roof. Second-floor has paired one-over-one wood windows in right and left bays, single, smaller one-over-one wood window in the center. Center wall dormer with one-over-one window.

Fort Stanwix Park South

107 Fort Stanwix Park South ca. 1908

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story frame residence with rectangular footprint, two bays wide by two bays deep with pyramidal hipped roof. Stone foundation; composite shingle siding; asphalt shingle roof. Full-width entrance porch with solid sided rail, fluted posts and flat entablature; gable over entrance. Porch shelters fixed picture window on the left, two doors on the right. Second-floor has paired one-over-one replacement windows on the left, single oneover-one window on the right. Broad, nearly full-width gable dormer with returns and a bank of three wood windows: center window is one-over-one double hung sash and is taller than the two flanking windows which are fixed with decorative diamond munitin pattern in upper half creating the appearance of double-hung windows.

One-story, one bay frame garage with gable roof, stone foundation, vinyl siding and metal roofing; decorative windows, ca. 1920.

111 Fort Stanwix Park South ca. 1908

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story frame residence with rectangular footprint and side-gable roof. Rock-faced concrete block foundation; wood clapboard (first floor) and shingle (second floor) siding; asphalt shingle roof. Full-width entrance porch extends past east side of house and has tall, broad piers with modern random stone veneer supporting paired and triple battered columns. Porch has a pediment over the entrance and wood rail, square spindles in groups of three. Porch shelters off-center door with one-over-one window to the right, one-over-one window to the left and one-over-one window on the cutaway corner. Second-floor has bay window on the right with closed-gable above, double-hung window on the left with decorative muntin pattern in upper sash. Gableroof dormer on the left aligned with second-floor window.

One-story, gable roof garage with board-and batten siding is minimally visible behind porch extension, ca. 1920.

113 Fort Stanwix Park South ca. 1905

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Two-story frame residence, rectangular footprint and hipped roof. Parged foundation; wood clapboard siding; asphalt shingle roof. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with solid sided rail and slender columns, paired and in groups of three, supporting low-pitched roof with brackets. Porch shelters off-center door with multi-lite picture window on the left; tall vegetation and opaque porch curtain obscure fenestration right of the door. Two one-over-one wood windows on the second-floor. Broad gable dormer with fishscale shingle siding, bank of three wood windows (taller two-over-one center sash flanked by shorter diamond-paned fixed windows), brackets in the cornice.

One-story frame garage with gable roof, single overhead rolling garage door and wood cove siding, ca. 1920.

115 Fort Stanwix Park South ca. 1890

one contributing primary building, one non-contributing secondary building (due to age)

Two-story frame residence with cross-gable roof. Stone foundation; wood clapboard siding; asphalt shingle roof. Gable section is two bays wide with one-over-one windows evenly spaced on the first and second floors with wood hood molds. All upper story gables have rounded fishscale shingles and six-lite fixed or casement window. Side-gable wing on east elevation, one-bay wide by two-bays deep; pent-roof entrance porch with turned columns, sheltering door. Side-gable wing on west elevation is one-bay wide by two-bays deep.

One-story frame garage with gable roof, off-center single overhead rolling garage door and pedestrian door; vinyl siding and asphalt shingle roof, 2002.

117 Fort Stanwix Park South ca. 1908 one contributing primary building

Two-story frame residence with rectangular footprint and side-gable roof. Stone foundation; vinyl siding; asphalt shingle roof. Full-width, enclosed entrance porch with row of eight one-over-one windows and remnant shallow pediment indicating original entrance location, otherwise obscured by windows and siding. Second-floor has two one-over-one windows evenly spaced with gable-roof dormer above each window. Shallow two-story bay window on west elevation. Entrance on left side of porch sheltered by gable hood.

119 Fort Stanwix Park South ca. 1908

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story frame residence, Queen Anne style with cross-gable roof and three-story round tower. Stone foundation; mix of clapboard, wood shingle, vinyl and composite siding; ashpalt shingle roof. Full-width entrance porch with shingle-clad piers that support round columns, single and grouped in threes; wood rail with turned posts. Porch shelters slightly off-center, double wood doors with one-over-one window to either side. Three-story round tower in the northwest corner has one-over-one windows on the first and second floors, fixed diamond panes on the third floor and conical roof. Second-floor has two one-over-one wood windows with storms; in the center is a decorative panel with low-relief wreath-and-festoon motif. Palladian window in gable with diamond muntins in outer windows.

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One-story, two-bay frame garage with two garage doors facing Bissell Avenue to the west; boarded pedestrian door on north side. Garage has wood cove siding and hipped, asphalt-shingle roof, ca. 1920.

Fort Stanwix Park 1889 one contributing site

Neighborhood park, about 2.5 acres with North James Street to the east, North Washington Street to the west and Fort Stanwix Park (the street, which is an extension of Myrtle Street) to the south. North side of park is continuous with the front lawns of neighboring houses with no separating street except a short cul-de-sac extending east from North Washington Street. Level topography; grassy with irregularly placed deciduous trees in a variety of species and sizes. Sidewalks line the east, west and south with a semicircular curved paved walk in the center connecting to the outer sidewalks. Lamp poles line the south side of the park and the internal walk. This site was Rome's original cemetery, established in 1823, and became a public park in 1889, after all interments had been removed.

Huntington Street- Even

120 Huntington Street ca. 1860 one contributing primary building

One and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep cross-gable rectangular plan residence with parged foundation, clapboard siding, primarily one over one double-hung vinyl replacement windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features ca.1920 one-story, two-bay entrance porch, two central doors with Tuscan order wood columns, pilasters and square balustrades.

100 Maple Street ca. 1905

one contributing primary building, one non-contributing secondary building (due to age)

Two story, frame residence with modified rectangular footprint and cross-gable roof. Foundation material not visible; stucco walls; asphalt shingle roof. Two sections: three-bay wide by one-bay deep main section on the left, one-bay wide by two-bay deep, one and a half story recessed wing on the right. Three-bay main section has banks of one-over-one replacement windows on first and second floor, except in right bay which has a recessed entrance porch with arched openings sheltering door and one window. Above this is a cross-gable with a diminutive bay window. Block modillions in the eaves. Side-gable, recessed side wing has a vinyl-clad bay window with six one-over-one replacement windows; shed dormer above.

One-story garage with low-pitched gable roof, one double-width garage door and a pedestrian door. Stucco exterior with vinyl siding in gable, ca. 1970.

102 Maple Street ca. 1925

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Two and a half story, two-bay wide by five-bay deep gable rectangular plan residence with asymmetrical gable roof. Stone foundation, aluminum siding, primarily six over one, two over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Extended roof overhang on the east shelters side porch with large square columns and arched opening. Windows on the first and second floor are paired. Shed dormer on west elevation.

One-story, three-bay hipped-roof garage with aluminum siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1925.

104 Maple Street

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

One and a half story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep cross-gable Craftsman-style bungalow with parged foundation, wood shingle siding, primarily cottage style double-hung, casement wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features half-width, one-story entrance porch, extending past the east elevation with squat battered piers supporting square wood columns. Left of the porch, bisecting a projecting nested gable is a similarly squat, broad chimney flanked by square windows. Brackets on the main roof; exposed rafter tails on the porch roof.

One-story, two-bay gable roof garage with wood shingle siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1920.

One-story, one-bay entrance porch, central door with square columns and balustrades, continuous with pent overhang across the bay window on the left and group of three windows on the right. Sun porch on the east elevation.

One-story, two-bay gable roof garage with wood shingle siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1920.

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by five-bay deep cross-gable Tudor Revival rectangular plan residence with brick and stucco walls, primarily fixed, casement wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. L-shaped with two-story, side-gable section to the north, narrower one and a half story wing projecting south with entrance door set back on the east beneath overhang of gable roof. Broad brick chimney with panel of herringbone-pattern brickwork centered on the gable.

One-story, three-bay gable roof garage with vertical siding, stucco-clad walls and asphalt shingle roofing, 1941.

202 Maple Street

ca. 1920

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two and a half story, five-bay wide by two-bay deep side-gable rectangular plan residence with brick foundation, shingle siding (probably composite), primarily one over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with square columns and balustrades shelters central door flanked by groups of three windows on either side. Porch is topped with full-width balcony on the second floor with square piers and balusters added in 2017. Sun porch on the east elevation.

One-story, two-bay hipped garage with wood shingle siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1920.

204 Maple Street

ca. 1910

one contributing primary building, one non-contributing secondary building (due to age)

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep hipped roof rectangular plan residence with random ashlar stone and masonry block foundation, clapboard and wood shingle siding, primarily nine over one doublehung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with square columns and narrow square wood balusters, shelters off-center door, double-hung window with decorative upper sash on the left, triple window on the right. Triple window with decorative upper sash in gable dormer.

One-story, one-bay gable roof garage with brick and wood panel walls and asphalt shingle roofing. Garage does not appear on 1930 Sanborn maps and has modern proportions, ca. 1970.

206 Maple Street

ca. 1920

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Two and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep cross-gable rectangular plan residence with stone foundation partially obscured by parging, vinyl siding, primarily nine over nine, six over six, one over one double-hung vinyl windows and standing seam metal roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with square columns and balusters, spans façade and wraps to the west. Porch shelters door on the left and secondary door on the right, partial porch enclosure in wraparound.

One-story, three-bay side-gable garage with clapboard siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1920.

300 Maple Street ca. 1920 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by two-bay deep side-gable rectangular plan residence with parged foundation, clapboard siding (first floor), wood shingle (second floor) siding, primarily one over one double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. One-bay entrance porch, center door with metal rail, wood columns and gable roof. Two diamond-paned casement windows above entrance porch with center shed dormer above. One-story, one-bay sun porch on the east and attached garage to the north.

302 Maple Street ca. 1925

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

One and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep residence with brick foundation and walls, primarily six over six double-hung wood windows, tall casements and asphalt shingle roofing. L-shaped, cross-hip configuration; steeply pitched roof. One-story, two-bay shed-roof porch with classical columns spans the façade and east, sheltering arched entrance door. Dentiled cornice interrupted by shed-roof wall dormers.

One-story, three-bay hipped garage with clapboard siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1940.

304 Maple Street ca. 1925 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by two-bay deep side-gable rectangular plan residence with panel face patterned concrete block foundation, stucco and clapboard siding, primarily six over six double-hung vinyl windows occurring in pairs and singly; asphalt and composite shingle roofing. One-story, one-bay entrance porch with classic order columns. Sun porch on the west elevation with banks of six-over-one windows.

304 Maple Street (Rear)
ca. 1925
one contributing secondary building

One-story, one-bay gable roof garage with clapboard siding and asphalt shingle roofing.

306 Maple Street 1924

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Two and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep side-gable rectangular plan residence with concealed foundation, vinyl siding, primarily eight over one double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Onestory, one-bay entrance porch in the right bay with paired square columns and pilasters. Sun porch on the east elevation.

Two and a half story, two-bay clipped-gable hipped roof carriage house with clapboard siding and asphalt shingle roofing. Although this outbuilding has the size and character of a carriage house that predates the main house, it was not shown on Sanborn maps through 1930 and may have been moved to this location.

Full-width, one-story entrance porch with solid balustrade and square vinyl-sided columns shelters off-center door, left of which are two double-hung windows flanking a short rectangular window with diamond muntin pattern. Triple window on the second-floor; square window in attic with diamond muntin pattern.

200 North George Street 1928 one contributing primary building

Two-story, two-bay wide by five-bay deep, flat roof rectangular plan building with brick-clad foundation and wall construction, terra-cotta speed block on less-visible east and north elevations and non-visible roof material. Fixed storefront windows over brick bulkhead; transoms covered. Second-floor has central single window flanked by two pairs of windows. Shaped parapet with inset panel reading "19 Baker 28." Secondary storefront on the left side retains historic arrangement of low block bulkhead and display windows flanking recessed entrance with covered transoms. Windows on west elevation in regular pattern of paired and single sash.

Two-story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep pyramidal-hipped roof square plan residence with parged foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Oval oculus on the second-floor center; eyebrow window, center infilled with vinyl siding.

210 North George Street ca. 1864 one contributing primary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep side-gable rectangular plan building with parged foundation, vinyl siding, primarily six over six double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features a full-width, one-story entrance porch, ca. 1979 with turned posts and no rail. Porch shelters off-center door with narrow sidelights and transom flanked by flat pilasters; right of door is a picture window flanked by six-over-six replacement windows. Scroll brackets on the eaves. Telescoping rear additions.

212 North George Street ca. 1860 one contributing primary building

One and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep gable rectangular-plan residence with random ashlar stone foundation, clapboard, wood vertical siding on façade first floor, primarily one over one double-hung

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wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with square columns and wood rail; door on the left with narrow diamond-paned sidelights and transom; one-over-one windows on center and right bays. Side-gable hood on the south elevation shelters basement entrance beneath porch.

214 North George Street ca. 1875 one contributing primary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep gable rectangular plan residence with parged foundation, vinyl siding, primarily six over six double-hung vinyl windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features one-bay, one-story entrance porch, door with narrow sidelights in left bay with wrought iron columns and balustrades.

216 North George Street ca. 1870 one contributing primary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep, low-sloping hipped roof rectangular plan residence with parged foundation, clapboard, wood shingle siding, primarily two over two, one over one double-hung windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features ca.1925 one-bay, one-story projecting entrance vestibule, door with square columns; pent overhang spans façade left of entrance. Bay window and sun porch on north elevation.

216 North George Street (Rear) ca. 1870 one contributing secondary building

Two-story, six-bay wide by two-bay deep cross-gable carriage house with vinyl clapboard siding and standing seam metal roofing.

218 North George Street ca. 1850 one contributing primary building

Two-story, four-bay wide by five-bay deep cross-gable T-plan residence with parged foundation, wood shingle siding, primarily two over four and one over one double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Historic maps show a gable-and-wing plan; side wing expanded ca. 1900 to two stories. Main block has an off-center double doors in right bay sheltered by a one-bay, one-story entrance porch with flared shingle-sided rail, grouped wood columns and hipped roof. Tall casement windows on the first floor in left and right bays, evenly spaced one-over-one windows on the second-floor. Slightly recessed wing on the south has a wraparound porch with flared solid sided balustrade and round columns matching those of entrance porch, above which is a broad bay window.

300 North George Street Kimball House 1849 one contributing primary building

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Two-story, three-bay wide by six-bay deep gable Greek Revival-style linear plan residence with stone foundation, brick and clapboard siding, primarily two over two double-hung wood windows and standing seam metal roofing. Building features two-story, three-bay temple-front portico with square columns. Double doors in left bay with transom above; floor-to-ceiling windows on the first floor in right and center bays. Clapboard siding in pediment. Telescoping east additions terminate with a one-story, two bay attached garage with clapboard siding and standing seam metal roofing.

304 North George Street ca. 1868 one contributing primary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep hipped roof rectangular plan residence with random ashlar stone foundation, brick clad wall construction, primarily one over one double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. One-story, one-bay gable entrance porch in left bay with round wood columns, turned wood balustrade and metal handrail; porch shelters door with sidelights and transom. Flat stone sills and lintels; prominent decorative scrolled brackets in the eaves. One-story, one-bay clapboard-sided addition to the north of primary volume. Telescoping rear additions to the east.

308 North George Street ca. 1850 one contributing primary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by six-bay deep gable linear plan residence with parged foundation, composite siding, primarily one over one double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story, entrance porch shelters door with sidelights, transom and two tall windows to the left. Recessed one-story, onebay addition on the south elevation with secondary entrance.

310 North George Street ca. 1850 one contributing primary building

One and a half story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep gable rectangular-plan residence with rusticated concrete foundation, mix of composite siding and cedar shingles on the first floor façade and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch with solid sided rail and battered posts sheltering door on the left bay, oneover-one replacement windows center and right bays. Raked cornice with returns.

312 North George Street ca. 1850 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep gable rectangular plan residence with stone foundation, clapboard siding, primarily one over one double-hung replacement windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Fullwidth, one-story entrance porch sheltering door with transom and semi-elliptical fanlight on the left, one-overone replacement windows center and right bays; porch extends past south side of the building to create a portecochere. Three evenly spaced one-over-one windows on the second-floor with decorative hoods. Raked cornice with returns. Palladian window in gable. Porch extended ca. 1910; Palladian window and second-floor window trim may also be alterations from ca. 1910.

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314 North George Street ca. 1928

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep gable rectangular plan residence with rock-faced concrete block foundation, composite siding, primarily one over one double-hung windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Fullwidth, one-story entrance porch, central door with low-pitched gable flanked by banks of storm windows. Shaped rafter tails and triangular knee brace brackets.

One-story, two-bay gable roof garage with composite siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1928.

318 North George Street

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep rectangular plan residence and low-pitched hipped roof. Presumed stone foundation, brick wall construction, primarily twelve over twelve double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Slightly projecting one-story enclosed entrance porch on the left bay.

One-story, two-bay side-gable carriage house with brick wall construction, asphalt shingle roofing with onestory, one-bay addition on the north elevation, vertical siding and standing seam metal roofing, ca. 1860.

320 North George Street John J. Parry House **Architect: John J Parry (mason/contractor)** ca. 1850

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by five-bay deep hipped roof rectangular plan residence with stone foundation, brick walls and batten-seam standing seam metal roofing. Windows generally two over two double-hung wood sash; windows on main portion of house have pointed hood moldings with raised decorative motif and corner brackets; façade windows also have paneled aprons. One-story entrance porch with pointed hood supported by ornate brackets with drops and incised trim; hood shelters door with sidelights and covered transom. Two-bay, one-story wood frame addition (ca. 1971-81) on the south, in front of older addition whose frieze windows and decorative brackets are visible. One and a half story east addition.

Two-story, three-bay side gable carriage house with brick construction, batten-seam standing seam metal roofing, ca.1920.

Two-story, three-bay wide by five-bay deep, gable Romanesque Revival-style T-shaped plan church with stone foundation, brick wall construction, picture and stained-glass windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features one-bay, four-story corner tower on southwest corner with drop moldings extending from brick

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corbelling and large bull's eye window. Six-bay, two-story, brick gable roof parish house to the east, 1910. Education wing to the northeast, 2006.

404 North George Street vacant lot (not counted)

408 North George Street vacant lot (not counted)

410-18 North George Street Nun and Harper Funeral Home ca. 1961 one contributing primary building

Two-story L-shaped plan brick and vinyl sided building with hipped roof in rear, bay windows and attached garage.

500 North George Street ca. 1890 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, two bay wide by four-bay deep, linear plan residence with hipped roof, concealed foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Full-width, one-story entrance porch extends past south elevation; porch has wood columns and balusters. Two-story, one-bay-by-one-bay projecting wing on the south with cutaway corners and decorative scroll brackets on the first floor.

502 North George Street ca.1890 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep cross-gable residence with parged foundation, clapboard siding, primarily one over one double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. One-bay, one-story gable entrance porch with classic columns, pediment gable and wrought iron stair railings; porch shelters door with transom.

504 North George Street E.F. Walker House ca. 1895 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, four-bay wide by four-bay deep cross-gable rectangular plan building. Random ashlar stone foundation, clapboard and wood sawtooth shingle siding, primarily one over one double-hung, wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. One-story entrance porch extends past north corner and shelters paired doors. Bay window on the second-floor above which is asymmetrical gable with flare on the north; group of five windows in gable with semi-elliptical fanlight. Oversized eaves and exaggerated modillions on the porch and main roof.

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508 North George Street ca. 1895

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep side-gable rectangular plan residence with random ashlar stone foundation, clapboard siding, primarily one over one double-hung wood windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features two hexagonal towers, on the southwest and northwest corners. One-story, three-bay entrance porch extends past south tower and wraps corner, sheltering paired paneled doors in the recessed side wing. Porch has solid vinyl-sided rail and round wood columns. Recessed porch on north with cutaway corner, solid rail and round columns. Palladian windows in gable ends, modified on the north elevation.

One and a half story, two-bay side-gable garage with clapboard siding and asphalt shingle roofing, ca. 1905.

510 North George Street ca. 1880 one contributing primary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by three-bay deep cross-gable T-plan residence with concealed foundation, vinyl siding, primarily one over one double-hung windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Building features one-story overhang at entrance with square wood columns.

512 North George Street

Wright House; Kingsley House; Rome Sanitarium; St. Nicholas Ukrainian Church **Architect: John J Parry (mason/contractor)** 1866

one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two and a half story, three-bay wide by six-bay deep, cross-gable residence with non-visible foundation, mix of textured stucco-clad and brick walls, primarily one over one double-hung wood, picture windows and asphalt shingle roofing. Façade has central symmetrical two and a half story gable section, three bays wide, flanked by long one-story wings on either side. Center section has one-bay, one-story entrance vestibule with roundarched door opening flanked by one round-arched window to either side; above this is a two-story projecting bay with paired arched windows in a single decorative surround, paired rectangular windows in the attic, topped by hipped roof with scrolled brackets on the eaves. One-bay, one-story enclosed porch on the north elevation and two-bay, one-story porte-cochere on the south elevation. Alterations in 1949 include enclosing entrance porch, addition of porte cochere and addition of stucco patterned siding. Originally the residence of Benjamin Huntington Wright, it became the Rome Sanitarium (1896), then the parsonage for St. Nicholas Ukrainian Church (1949); it was transformed into the church sanctuary in 1959. Minor exterior changes were made when it was converted back into a residence in 2005.

600 North George Street **Pritchard-Van Dresar House** 1870 one contributing primary building

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Two-story, three-bay wide by seven-bay deep shallow hipped Italianate-style rectangular plan residence with concealed foundation, brick exterior, primarily one over one double-hung wood windows and metal roofing. Building features ca.1900 full-width, one-story, entrance porch, sheltering paired door in left bay; and ca.1900 one-story, one-bay side porch; both the front section and side wing feature segmentally arched pediments that rise above the flat window hoods on brackets. Two-story east wing added in late nineteenth century to which two-story wing was added in twentieth century. Two-story, two-bay attached garage to the east.

602 North George Street ca. 1875 one contributing primary building, one contributing secondary building

Two-story, three-bay wide by four-bay deep cross-gable residence with parged foundation, vinyl siding, mix of window types including six over one double-hung replacement sash and tall six-pane windows on first-floor; standing seam metal roofing. 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Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph

The Rome Residential Historic District, located just north of the city's commercial core, is significant under Criterion A for community planning & development and under Criterion C for architecture. The layout and architecture of the neighborhood, developed from the mid-nineteenth to the mid-twentieth century, illustrate the changing circumstances and architectural tastes of Rome's citizens as they capitalized on the city's advantageous location in the growing national transportation network to build a significant industrial economy.

Residents began building elaborately styled houses first in the southern portions of the nominated district in the 1840s and 1850s, as the rerouting of the Erie Canal through central Rome and railroad construction in the midnineteenth century spurred rapid economic and physical growth in the village. Following the city's incorporation in 1870, industrialization and municipal improvements encouraged neighborhood growth, reflected in the construction of houses in fashionable new styles and in the nominated district's growing economic diversity and density. Residential construction continued into the district's farthest northern reaches in the first half of the twentieth century as the streetcar, then the automobile allowed prosperous families to commute farther distances to white-collar work in the commercial and industrial zones of the city's south and east. By the mid-twentieth century, consolidation within the metal industry caused less of the profits from local production to be invested in Rome, meaning that the few undeveloped lots left in the district saw houses of more modest construction during this period. Despite the general impacts of deindustrialization in Rome and other upstate cities, the growth of Griffiss Air Force Base, which opened in 1942, was a stabilizing force on the local economy; the nominated district also benefited from the reuse of some of the nominated district's large residences by local institutions. These factors were among those that mitigated the impacts of economic stagnation, aggressive Urban Renewal, and depopulation, which caused other areas in Rome to lose much of their historic fabric.

The Rome Residential Historic District is also significant under Criterion C as a substantially intact collection of residential and religious architecture dating from the mid-nineteenth through the mid-twentieth century, reflecting the evolution of popular architectural styles in both high-style and vernacular forms. The northward expansion of the area through time as the city spread from its downtown core is well illustrated by the progression of popular architectural styles from south to north, from Greek Revival and Italianate residences prevalent in the south part of the district to post-WWII houses to the north. The largest and most high-style buildings are concentrated in the district's core, on large lots along North Washington and North George streets, with more vernacular expressions of popular styles seen on the smaller lots at the district's west and east fringes. Styles represented in the district's residential architecture include Greek Revival, Gothic Revival, Second Empire, Stick, Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, French Eclectic, Craftsman, Tudor Revival, and Postwar Modern. Several houses were designed and/or built by locally prominent architects and builders, including Archimedes Russell, William H. Davies, Daniel B. Prince, Hiram Soper, H. C. Baldwin, and John D. Parry.

The nominated district's period of significance opens ca.1840 when its earliest buildings were constructed on the southern and eastern periphery as the rerouting of the Erie Canal directly through central Rome stimulated the village's economic and physical growth. The end date of 1970 represents a confluence of factors: the district was almost entirely built out by this time, with the last few open lots filled by Cape Cod and Ranch-style houses. New development in the second half of the twentieth century was driven primarily by the growth of Griffiss Air Force Base on the city's far eastern outskirts, rather than by the traditional industries that had fueled the development of the district and occurred elsewhere in the region. By the 1960s, Rome's population had peaked and was beginning to decline. The specific end date of 1970 was chosen because it was in that year that

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demolition began for the city's major Ft. Stanwix-Downtown Urban Renewal Project, which is located just south of the nominated district. This project obliterated a substantial swath of the oldest portion of downtown, in an effort to revitalize the city through the creation of a pedestrian shopping area along historic Dominick Street along with the complete reconstruction of eighteenth-century Fort Stanwix. The project signaled a different and very specific direction for the city: a vision of a future geared toward tourism. Local leaders saw an opportunity to leverage federal funding to accomplish a project they had long desired, the creation of a tourist attraction associated with the long-gone fort, and to pair it with a modernization of the downtown business district. Dozens of buildings, including many of the city's oldest, were demolished, and a handful were moved, to complete the project, which left Rome with little historic fabric in its commercial area. The nominated district, lying outside the bounds of the Urban Renewal area, survived with its historic character intact, leaving it as the section of Rome best able to convey the city's growth and evolution in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

Narrative Statement of Significance

Criterion A: Community Planning and Development

Early History of Rome, to the 1840s

The site of the city of Rome has long significance as a key transportation connection point. The present-day city sits astride a location known to the Oneida Nation of the Iroquois Confederacy as De-o-Wain-Sta, and later by European settlers as "The Great Carrying Place." This was a seasonally variable portage of approximately three miles between the Mohawk River, to the east, and Wood Creek, to the west; Wood Creek connects to Oneida Lake and ultimately to the Great Lakes. As such the "Carrying Place" was a key site on an important route linking the Atlantic Ocean to the Great Lakes, highly valued by the Oneida Nation for its economic and political significance.²

As Europeans' presence increased in the late seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, the French and British increasingly competed for control of the North American interior, a rivalry that culminated in the French & Indian War in the 1750s. At the beginning of this conflict, the British built two small forts at the "Great Carrying Place" to facilitate control of access to the Great Lakes; when these forts were attacked by a party of combined French and Native forces in March 1756, British General John Stanwix was ordered to construct a more substantial fort in 1758. (Figure 1). The British victory in the war shortly thereafter diminished the fort's importance, and it was abandoned over the next decade. In 1776, the new American Congress authorized General Philip Schuyler to oversee restoration of the fort to defend the newly declared nation's western frontier, a task completed by Colonel Peter Gansevoort in the spring of 1777. The fort withstood and thwarted a siege in August 1777, preventing the massing of British troops in the Mohawk-Hudson drainage and thus partly enabling the crucial American success at Saratoga later that year, and supporting the ultimate American victory several years later.³

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In the aftermath of the War for Independence, New York State moved to confiscate and redistribute lands held by Loyalist elites. Through this process, a wealthy New York City shipping magnate, Dominick Lynch, purchased land that had been confiscated by the State, including much of the present site of Rome. Over the next decade, Lynch added to his holdings, owning about 2,000 acres by 1800.⁴ Lynch was a trustee of the Western Inland Lock Company, which had been chartered by the state in 1792 to develop a continuous water route from the Hudson to Lake Ontario. As such, he anticipated the construction of a canal across the Carrying Place in the mid-1790s and recognized the development potential of the site that would become Rome. The canal was built in 1797 between the Mohawk River and Wood Creek, running roughly along the same route as present-day Erie Boulevard West, south of the nominated district (Figure 2). He had the project's engineer, William Weston, survey part of his holdings situated on relatively high land in the vicinity of the canal for a new settlement that he called "Lynchville." Weston's plan for Lynchville was a grid of blocks measuring 400 by 600 feet, oriented to the alignment of the canal (slightly canted from an east-west orientation); each block was divided into 66- by 200-foot building lots. The first streets developed were Dominick and James, outside the nominated district; a map of Lynchville drawn circa 1800 depicted the area bounded by Jay, Bloomfield, James, and Dominick streets, although the only ones that were "opened to any extent" prior to 1850 were Dominick, Washington, James, and Liberty streets. This layout guided Rome's early development and remains legible in the present streetscape. Allotments were made for a courthouse, jail, school, and church on two central squares in this plan. John Barnard established a tavern on one of the central squares as early as 1793, and George Huntington also began to amass his family's later wealth as the settlement's first merchant. By 1813, according to Spafford's Gazetteer, Rome was "a pleasant and thriving Post-Village," which had "about fifty wooden dwellings, a brick court-house, in which are held the courts for Oneida County alternately with Utica, a iail, a Presbyterian meeting-house, an arsenal for the deposit of military stores, and sundry shops, &c., in all about 90."6

Despite these early developments, several factors combined to limit the settlement's growth in the early nineteenth century. First, Lynch insisted on developing his land using an archaic "permanent lease" system, which did not appeal to settlers who wanted to own their land outright. Second, the Seneca Turnpike, built to improve an existing road from the Mohawk River ford at Utica to the western frontier town of Canandaigua (predecessor to present-day Route 5), bypassed Lynchville when it was completed in 1813. This development gave Utica and its businesses the economic advantage of the flow of New England migrants through Oneida County on their way toward western lands. Finally, though the construction of the original Erie Canal began in the vicinity of central Rome in 1817, its final route bypassed the settlement's center about half a mile to the south, through the level, soft soil of the "Great Swamp" (Figure 3). This distance proved impractically far, limiting the Canal's early economic impact on the village of Rome. Accordingly, the township's 78% population growth from 1810 to 1820 (from 2,003 to 3,569) declined to a more modest 22% growth rate in the 1820s and 30% in the 1830s. For comparison, settlements *directly* on the canal such as Rochester boomed with 513% and 119% population growth in those same decades following the Canal's completion. 8 Even with these constraints, however, textile factories and a sawmill operated on water power from a Mohawk River raceway in what is now East Rome, and the Bank of Rome was chartered in 1832 to facilitate transactions in the emerging

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regional market center. Still, physical growth was limited: when Lynch donated the 3.5-acre parcel that is now Fort Stanwix Park on N. James Street for use as a village cemetery in 1823, it was considered ample to accommodate burials in the modest settlement well into the future, and sufficiently distant from the village center – at ½-mile north of Dominick Street – to not impede further development (Figure 4).

In this context of modest growth, most of the nominated district area, which is to the northeast of the historic core of the settlement, remained pastureland. Liberty Street, the southern boundary of the nominated district, was reportedly not developed beyond N. Washington Street until 1835, and even then only saw a few houses of modest frame construction that were either razed or relocated later. For example, the ca.1808 Joshua Hathaway House at 313 North George Street, believed to be the oldest building in the nominated district, was not built on its present site, but much closer to the early settlement's center, on the 100 block of North James Street. It was moved to its present site in the far southern portion circa 1850.

In 1896, the author of *Our City and its People* described Rome at the middle of the nineteenth century:

...some forty-five years ago a person standing at the Erie Canal bridge and going up James to Dominick, down Dominick to Spring, up Spring to Liberty, and thence to George street, would describe very nearly the boundaries of Rome at that time (about 1850). It is true that James street was nearly if not quite built up to Thomas street and the so-called Stewart Buildings were on George street, west side, continuing from Liberty to Park street, and the arsenal and Mr. Howland's residence on Dominick street, beyond George, but aside from those and a few other buildings scattered here and there in different parts of the village, and with the exception of Factory Village and Canal Village, the foregoing was Rome as it would appear on a map of about 1850. Embargo was opened from James to Washington street, and no farther, and there were only two or three houses thereon. Court street was opened to Washington, but only two or three buildings were there. All north of Court street and west of Washington was a pasture. 10

Mid-19th Century Prosperity and Growth in Rome and the Residential District, 1840s-1870s

As the mid-nineteenth century approached, investment in infrastructure projects reestablished Rome as an important node in regional trade networks and set the framework for its transformation into an expanding, industrial city. First, the statewide enlargement of the Erie Canal (a project begun in the mid-1830s) brought the waterway into Rome's core by 1844. The new route reused the abandoned bed of the Western Inland Lock Company's canal running one block south of West Dominick Street. That route remains legible today as Erie Boulevard. The completion of the Black River Canal in the early 1850s connected much of the North Country of New York State to the Erie Canal through Rome, providing another boost to the village's importance as a transportation hub (Figure 4, Figure 5). Reflecting the influx of capital, new banks appeared in quick succession: Fort Stanwix Bank was organized in 1847; the Rome Exchange Bank (later the First National Bank) appeared in 1851; and the Central National Bank was chartered in 1854.

While the Erie Canal was in its heyday, railroads were already on the verge of eclipsing the waterway's economic importance, even in Rome, birthplace of the Canal. The west-east Syracuse & Utica Railroad first brought locomotives to Rome in 1839; the subsequent Rome & Watertown Railroad completed in 1851 made Rome a critical gateway in the North Country trade and spurred industrial development. In addition to

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facilitating lumber and ore shipment from the Tug Hill Plateau and Adirondacks, the expanded Rome, Watertown, and Ogdensburg Railroad line, under the leadership of Addison Day, relocated its repair shops to Rome in 1863, which encouraged growth of a local iron industry. The Rome Iron Works was founded in 1866 to reroll and straighten the line's wrought-iron rails, and the Merchant Iron Works was founded in 1870 by native Roman engineer John B. Jervis to manufacture consumer products.

After a slight population decline in the 1850s – in part a consequence of several large fires that destroyed Rome's commercial center in the mid-1840s - these industrial and manufacturing developments spurred Rome's population to grow by 76% in the 1860s, matching the rapid growth of its earliest days in the 1810s and 1820s. ¹¹ Even in 1850, before the city's industrial growth took off in earnest, 27% of the township of Rome's population was foreign born (mostly Irish and German), a statistic rivaled by few other townships in Oneida County, suggesting the degree to which Rome was becoming a magnet for immigrant labor. ¹²

Anticipating the population and wealth engendered by contemporary canal and railroad improvements, lawyer Calvert Comstock (later the first mayor of the city of Rome) and financier Edward Huntington (son of George Huntington, the settlement's first merchant), both of whom were involved in the local banking industry, purchased undeveloped land between North Washington and North George streets north of Court Street around 1848. Comstock and Huntington extended roadways and subdivided the land into generously sized lots for residential development, and then expanded their holdings to the north and west with subsequent purchases in the following decade. Prosperous residents were drawn to this newly developing area north of the village center, attractive due to its large lots and distance from the hubbub and pollution of the canals and railroads, and from the recurring flood and cholera risks of the Mohawk and nearby "Great Swamp." New residents included small-business owners like Nathaniel Mudge and L.E. Elmer (both grocers, 409 North Washington Street and 405 North George Street, respectively), and major industrialists like John B. Jervis, founder of the Merchant Iron Works (813 North Washington Street).

In 1870, in an act reflecting an expectation that Rome had the potential to grow far beyond its settled area, the city was incorporated using the boundaries of the original township, thereby becoming the largest city by land area in the nation at the time, at about 75 square miles (Syracuse, by comparison, today encompasses approximately 25 square miles). Incorporation signaled the community's continued progress and maturation and helped set the stage for orderly growth outward in all directions, as did the installation of a municipal water system in the early 1870s, with main lines running down North George and North James Streets. ¹⁴ The paving of North Washington Street with cobblestones in 1869 was another infrastructure improvement that reflected expanding ambitions and encouraged fashionable development.

Industrial and Residential Growth in the "Copper City," 1870s to 1920s¹⁵

Economic trends and infrastructure improvements created the conditions for new patterns of growth in Rome in the late nineteenth century. The national economic depression following the Panic of 1873 slowed business

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investment in Rome considerably; at the same time, steel supplanted wrought iron for use in locomotive rails, but the Rome Iron Works, in which many of Rome's leading men were heavily invested, did not have an adequate supply of coal or investment capital to make the transition to steel production. Nevertheless, the firm began manufacturing brass stock in 1878 and copper wire in the 1880s, taking advantage of the increasing demand for cheap, specialized metal products due to the growth and electrification of cities, the invention of the telephone and the emergence of consumer goods sold at the era's large department stores. The company, renamed the Rome Brass & Copper Company in 1891, provided brass and copper stock to local firms that fabricated consumer products such as bathtubs, bedsteads, and kettles, as well as construction materials such as tubing and electrical and telephone wire. By the 1920s, refrigeration, air conditioning, and automobiles were flooding the marketplace and demand for Rome metal for use in condensers, radiator tubing and the like, greatly increased. With access to agricultural produce and metals in abundance, canning also became a leading industry in the early twentieth century; the Fort Stanwix Canning Company was a leader among local firms in this area, operating from a complex a few blocks east of the nominated district. Immigration from southern and eastern Europe (particularly Poland and Italy) to neighborhoods in the south and east of Rome supplied blue-collar labor for these burgeoning industrial operations. By 1920, the city's 71 factories processed 10% of the nation's copper and employed 5,038 out of a population of 26,431 in both blue- and white-collar jobs. ¹⁶

The introduction of new city services accommodated and facilitated growth, as the city's population increased by an average of 29% in each of the first three decades of the twentieth century. ¹⁷ A horse-drawn streetcar loop was introduced in 1887, following a path north on North James Street from the commercial center before turning west on W. Linden Street, south on N. Madison Street, west again on W. Thomas Street, south on Expense Street, and then back east to the commercial center on Dominick Street. After a brief experiment in powering the line with a locally produced compressed-air technology, the streetcar system was electrified in 1903, and lines were quickly extended well beyond the original loop, facilitating residential development extending outward from downtown. The introduction of a sewer system in the 1890s also improved city life, as did the creation in 1910 of a more reliable water system utilizing Fish Creek to the northwest of the city. Zoning, introduced sometime in the period from 1914-1924, established a residential zone essentially north of Park Street where "stores, markets, gas stations, factories, or public garages" were excluded; factories were excluded from the mercantile zone at the city's center along Dominick Street, while there were no restrictions in the industrial districts to the south and far east across the Mohawk River. ¹⁸

The urbanization, industrialization and civic sophistication of Rome during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries is reflected in the built environment of the nominated district area. Through the turn of the century, when the city's population was expanding but the horse-drawn streetcar was still the only realistic public transit option for most people, the demand for housing close to the city center in the residential zone was high. In response, some homeowners in the southern portions of the district built secondary dwellings at the rear of their often-ample lots fronting on what had been service alleys. Surviving examples of this trend include 406-408 Scott Avenue (built as a double residence on the property of 409 North Washington Street); 309 Brush Avenue (originally a secondary house behind 308 North George Street), 410-412 Brush Avenue (built as a double house on the lot of 215 West Thomas Street); and 114 W. Court Street (built on the rear of the lot of 300 North Washington Street). Modest Colonial Revivals and vernacular houses also appeared on subdivided lots throughout the southern part of the district during this period. Another strategy for adding density to meet the demand for housing was the construction of purpose-built duplexes, such as at 121-123 West Embargo Street,

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616-618 North Washington Street, and 502-504 North Madison Street. The four-story, purpose-built Mayflower Apartments at 301 North George Street, built on a long-vacant lot in the dense southern portion of the district toward the end of this period, was an example of property owners' efforts to maximize rents in an already crowded residential neighborhood close to the commercial district. These secondary and multiple-unit dwellings increased the density and economic diversity of what had been a predominantly wealthy enclave, in a trend seen in growing cities across the United States at the time.

Houses and building lots were subdivided, the density rose, and the hemmed-in streets became less bucolic in appearance. Workingmen's cottages replaced villas, duplexes replaced cottages and, eventually, apartment buildings replaced duplexes.¹⁹

As density and street traffic increased in the southern portions of the district, families accumulating the most wealth from Rome's industrialization increasingly chose to live in newly developing northerly areas of the city where they could have more space, less noise, and better air quality. The area on and around North Washington Street north of Turin Street saw upper-class development in Queen Anne-style residences in the late nineteenth century, especially after the removal of burials at the old city cemetery was completed in the mid-1880s and the land was converted to Fort Stanwix Park. Vogel Park and the green median on North George Street were designed to attract the city's well-to-do, who built large Tudor Revival-style and Colonial Revival-style houses in the central and north parts of the district in the early twentieth century. George H. Allen, the first president of Revere Copper and Brass took up residence at 900 North George Street in a Colonial Revival, expanded by architect Douglas Fitch in the early 1930s. Although the district's orderly layout and amenities point to coordinated planning, real estate advertisements of the era suggest once the land was subdivided, residential construction in and around the nominated district mainly occurred at a small scale, with lots sold and developed individually or in small clusters.

As automobile ownership was gradually adopted by Rome residents, auto-oriented buildings began to appear in the city. Early private garages first appeared in association with the larger houses of the area's wealthiest residents in the southern portion of the district. A notable early automobile owner was Samuel B. Stevens, son of James Stevens, who was the first American to import a Rolls-Royce car, storing it with his collection of cars in the large garage he had constructed behind his house at 315 North Washington Street in the earliest part of the twentieth century (Figure 7). Just around the corner from the Stevens house, 14-year-old Howard Sears began repairing and selling bicycles in 1910 from the carriage house behind his family's opulent 207 West Embargo Street house; over the next several years he transitioned to selling auto parts, then, by 1919, gasoline. The carriage house where Sears started his business survives, now in residential use at 313 Scott Avenue. Sears incorporated the business as Sears Oil Co. in 1925 and constructed many early gas stations across the region as automobile ownership became more common. A rare surviving example is the ca.1930 Sears Oil station at 201 North George Street, now a museum. ²¹

In the 1910s and 1920s, as Craftsman, Colonial Revival, and Tudor Revival-style houses began to fill the final portions of the Huntington lands north of West Garden Street, most were built with garages, reflecting the degree to which the proliferation of automobile ownership made the district's northward expansion possible.

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Access to these garages from service alleys like Jeans Avenue, Dyett Drive, and Ed Murphy Lane kept prestigious George Street as well as new streets named for trees picturesquely free from heavy car traffic.

Civic and religious institutions expanded in the district to service the needs of the growing population. Fort Stanwix School was opened adjacent to the streetcar line at 112 West Linden Street in 1921 to accommodate the burgeoning population of families in the city's northern reaches. Churches also expanded their footprints to accommodate growing congregations, starting at Zion Episcopal Church where a parish hall, known as Clark Memorial Hall, was designed by Frederick Hubbard and built in 1884-85. Rome's German Evangelical Lutheran congregation built a new church building in the district at 215 West Court Street, now Trinty United Church of Christ, in 1928. The First United Methodist church expanded in 1911 with construction of Ninde Memorial Chapel, and the Baptist church followed suit in the 1920s with the construction of a new educational building. St. Mary's Church complex grew in this time period as well, as the parish built its ca.1895 rectory (210 W. Liberty), ca.1900 convent (212 W. Liberty), and ca.1925 school building (214-216 W. Liberty).

New Directions in Rome and the District, 1930s to 1960s

The late 1920s, the Depression Era and World War II brought economic changes that affected the nature and pattern of Rome's growth in the twentieth century. As a result of national mergers in the copper, brass and wire industries, an increasing share of the profits from these well-established local industries were diverted elsewhere within large corporations. The Rome Wire Company became a division of the General Cable Corporation created by New York financial interests in 1927, to some degree decoupling local productive success from Rome's fortunes and even diverting the talents of local wire executive Herbert T. Dyett into more national pursuits when he became an executive in that new consolidated firm. Dyett resigned and founded the independent Rome Cable Corporation in 1936, but that firm too, operating in a more competitive and consolidated post-war economy, opened plants in California that decentralized corporate power and profits from Rome. Rome Cable's purchase by Alcoa in 1959 furthered the divestment from Rome. The local copper fabrication industry was also co-opted to some degree by national interests when Rome Brass and Copper became a unit within the Revere Copper and Brass conglomerate in 1928, though the consolidated company's headquarters remained in Rome.

The largest economic shift of the period, however, was the growth of employment at Griffiss Air Force Base and the associated Rome Air Development Center research lab after their opening in 1942 and 1951, respectively. Griffiss would go on to become Rome's largest employer in the second half of the twentieth century, but a large portion of that workforce was military personnel, stationed in Rome only temporarily.

Meanwhile, many of the district's larger houses were converted to institutional and commercial uses, as fewer families wanted to maintain such large residences. Still stately and enjoying proximity to many of the city's most prestigious churches, several of the larger, older houses in the district's southern portions became funeral parlors as the mid-twentieth century approached, including 210 West Court Street, 209 N. Washington Street, and 418 North George Street, where an older house was significantly expanded and completely remodeled in the late 1920s to accomplish its conversion. Other former residences were converted into doctors' offices, for example, the houses at 205 W. Court Street and 112 W. Court Street. Similarly, the Rome Sanitarium provided upscale health care at the former Wright / Kingsley mansion at 512 North George Street from 1896 into the 1930s. The former Wright / Kingsley house went through several more conversions: it became the recreation center and parsonage for St. Nicholas Ukrainian Church in 1949, then became the actual church in 1959, before being converted back into a private residence in 2005. Small elder care facilities were another reuse option for

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large houses; examples are the Rome Home, which occupied the ca. 1855 Italianate home at 417 N. Washington Street from 1916 to 2017 (Figure 8), and the more modest facility at 307 West Thomas Street.

Fraternal clubs took possession of several houses for their activities. For example, around the turn of the century, the Odd Fellows made the former residence at 120 Liberty Street (no longer extant) their headquarters, and later moved to the house at 401 North Washington Street. The Elks converted the Italianate Wheeler Armstrong House at 126 W. Liberty Street (NR listed in 1972) into their Neo-Classical headquarters. Similarly, the Veterans of Foreign Wars acquired the Stevens House on N. Washington Street in 1945. Other buildings that were converted to institutional uses were 505 North George Street, which became the Stebbins Colony of Rome State School, a vocational school for institutionalized juveniles, in the late 1920s, and the Tudor Revivalstyle Carpenter House at 308 West Bloomfield Street, which has housed the Rome Art and Community Center since 1968.

Other larger houses were simply divided for multifamily use, as at 311 N. Washington Street, 214 W. Court Street, 503 N. George Street, and 207 & 211 W. Embargo Street. Still others were demolished to make way for parking lots, as in the case of the Odd Fellows Lodge, or institutional expansion, like with Zion Episcopal Church's school expansion in 1953.

Because so many buildings remained in use, whether as single-family residences or through conversion to other uses, the nominated district retained much of its historic fabric even as central Rome immediately to the south was dramatically reconfigured by deindustrialization, highway construction, and Urban Renewal. Under the pressures of increased private car ownership and difficult financing during the Depression, Rome's streetcar ceased operations in 1932. Although bus service offered a transit alternative, ultimately the private automobile emerged as the dominant form of transportation, and Rome's infrastructure was reshaped to accommodate the ubiquitous automobile. In 1951, Erie Boulevard was opened as the area's first arterial highway using the former Erie Canal right of way, which had been abandoned when the waterway was rerouted south of downtown during the creation of the NYS Barge Canal in the late 1910s. Similarly, Black River Boulevard was opened in 1954 in the Black River Canal's right of way east of the district. The new highways spurred new development along their routes that obscured the earlier historic fabric.

Rome's leaders aggressively embraced Urban Renewal beginning in the late 1950s and continuing through the late 1970s, resulting in the loss of much of the city's dense, historic commercial core centered on Dominick Street along with a number of its oldest residences. One outcome of these extensive efforts was the reconstruction of Fort Stanwix as a heritage attraction at the heart of downtown Rome, built in an effort to boost the local tourism industry.

Criterion C: Architecture

As its name suggests, the establishment and growth of Rome as a European settlement coincided with a period of intense interest in classical antiquity, reflected in many place names across upstate New York. That interest extended to architecture, with Federal and Greek Revival styles, drawn from classical models, proving popular among those with the means to pursue the latest fashions. Although most of Rome's early growth occurred in the south half of "Lynchville," south of the nominated district's south boundary at Liberty Street, the district has several good examples of the classically inspired Federal and Greek Revival styles from the first half of the nineteenth century. The oldest building in the district, the ca. 1808 Joshua Hathaway House, was moved to its

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present site at 313 North George Street in the far southern portion of the district circa 1850 as noted above and is the district's best example of the strict symmetry and attenuated proportions of the Federal style.

The Greek Revival style is more common in the district. Two of the most notable examples are the Nock-Reid House at 211 West Embargo Street, a high-style example of a brick Greek Revival-style house with its dramatic two-story colonnade and pediment with tall entablature, and the similarly high-style house at 209 North Washington Street, which share similar proportions and details that suggest a common builder and/or pattern book may have guided both designs (Figure 9). The Nock-Reid house is known to have been the work of prolific builder John D. Parry, built circa 1850.

Five uniform Greek Revival-style dwellings were built on North George Street between Liberty and Park Streets only in the early 1840s; three survive, at 203, 207, and 209 North George Street, varying in integrity. Other modest, wood-frame Greek Revival-style buildings in this vicinity, such as 217 and 300 North Washington Street, 120 Huntington Street, and 109 & 111 W. Court Street, appear to have been built around this time as well, with the modest materials available to a small rural market village. The relatively small lots on which they were built reflect the city's compact layout during this period, with some retaining their original 66 feet by 200 feet dimensions.

The Greek Revival style remained popular in Rome at least into the 1850s and is especially well represented in the southern portion of the district. The circa 1850 Greek Revival house at 300 North George Street was reportedly built from bricks salvaged from the recently burned 1807 courthouse, which in turn was built of brick salvaged from the old Western Inland Lock Company Canal's decrepit locks. ²⁴ A series of nearly-identical modest wood-frame Greek Revival-style houses at 211, 213, and 215 West Thomas Street appear to have been constructed speculatively in the mid-1850s as well and retain distinctive Greek Revival massing and other features of the style despite later alterations.

By mid-century, Rome residents wishing to showcase their wealth and sophistication through architecture began using newly fashionable styles based on a broader range of historical examples, often copying or inspired by designs circulating in popular architectural pattern books. Rome once had three neighboring houses exemplifying the Gothic Revival style on North Washington Street. The most spectacular of the trio, the ca. 1855 house of Nathaniel Mudge (a local grocer) at 409 North Washington Street, closely resembles the high-style Gothic Revival plans in A. J. Downing's contemporary pattern books (Figure 10). Immediately to the north, 413 North Washington Street also displays Gothic Revival characteristics; the house immediately to the south at 401 North Washington Street originally reflected the Gothic Revival style as well but has since been remodeled.

The southern half of the district is replete with Italianate style houses, reflecting the immense popularity and longevity of this style. A few of the many excellent examples are the ca.1852 Italianate-style house built for grocer L.E. Elmer at 405 North George Street, and the similar and contemporary houses at 210 & 214 Court Street. Mason John Parry, who built many other houses in the district, built and lived in the Italianate house at 320 N. George Street and constructed the pair of ornate Italianate rowhouses at 417-419 North George Street in

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1855. Another notable example was the grand, Italianate-style brick house Comstock built on a large lot at the pastoral edge of his holdings in 1851, though that house was razed to make way for the YMCA in the late twentieth century (Figure 11). The closely related Second Empire style is less prevalent in the nominated district, but good examples do exist at 316 North Washington Street and 105 and 205 West Court Street.

In addition to high style examples, more modest vernacular interpretations of mid-century styles are common in the district, particularly on the smaller lots at the western ends of the extended streets and on the small lots east of North Washington already subdivided by the time of the Comstock-Huntington purchase. Vernacular expressions of the Italianate style are especially common such as at 308 and 318 West Embargo Street and 510 and 512 North Madison Street (all altered somewhat).

The National Register-listed John Bloomfield Jervis House (Jervis Public Library; listed in 1982) at 613 North Washington Street, designed and built by engineer and Merchant Iron Works founder John B. Jervis himself in 1858, was a bit of an anomaly, its classical design representing Jervis's "conservative and highly personal approach to design" that was out of step with mid-century fashion (Figure 12). The house became a public library in 1885 and has been significantly expanded to serve that purpose, but the oldest portion of the building still conveys Jervis's idiosyncratic aesthetic, confirming that not all buildings were designed with an eye to the most up-to-date architectural trends.

Early in Rome's history churches were located downtown, outside the nominated district, but as wealthy congregants moved farther out, new houses of worship were built in newly developing neighborhoods. These reflected popular religious architectural styles, particularly variations on Gothic Revival models considered especially suitable for Christian churches. The 1850-1851 English Gothic Revival-style Zion Episcopal Church (NR-listed in 1997), designed by preeminent mid-nineteenth century architect Richard Upjohn, was the first in this trend. The church was built on land formerly occupied by a school until an 1850 fire destroyed that building. An 1867 expansion of the church building (designed by the original architect's son, Richard B. Upjohn), attests to the durable growth in Rome's prospects and the wealth of its citizens in this period. ²⁶ The Presbyterian Church was next; the congregation replaced their ca.1808 edifice on Court Street with the large extant building at 108 West Court Street in 1853 (within the current NR-listed Gansevoort-Bellamy Historic District, listed in 1975). The congregation's 1855 Italianate-style parsonage at 509 North Washington Street sits within the nominated district. Also in 1869, the Methodist congregation constructed a new Romanesquestyle church on the northeast corner of West Embargo and North George Streets (NR-listed in 2010) to replace a ca.1829 church nearer to the courthouse, with the Baptist congregation following suit with a Romanesque / Gothic Revival-style church diagonally across the street in 1872 (remodeled in the 1920s). St. Mary's Catholic Church, having served Rome's growing German Catholic community from a "humble wooden structure" in the industrial and working-class neighborhood south of the Erie Canal since its founding in 1848, communicated the improving prosperity of their congregants by constructing a new building at 205 West Liberty Street in 1871, with the parochial school behind the church following a few years later. ²⁷ A number of minor churches also appeared and operated in the area, particularly on the smaller western lots, attesting to the growth and diversification of Rome's population that accompanied its economic expansion in the mid-nineteenth century. These included the Embargo Street Methodist Episcopal Society whose ca. 1860 modest wood-frame Gothic

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Revival-style structure at 317 West Embargo Street became the home of the Free Methodists by 1870, with an adjacent Second Empire-style parsonage built in the same time period. Modest Welsh Calvinistic Methodist and Congregational churches also appeared and operated at various locations in the southern portion of the district through the period, reflecting Welsh immigration toward the growing city from established enclaves throughout the surrounding agricultural region of northern Oneida County. ²⁸

Domestic architecture in the nominated district dating to the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries reflects Rome's prosperity and sophistication in this period, when many business and civic leaders affiliated with Rome's growing industries built fashionable houses in the styles of the day. In place of the strict symmetry and classical historical references of the Greek Revival and Italianate styles popular earlier in the century, architects and clients now adopted the exuberant Queen Anne with its complex footprints, rooflines and profusion of decorative detail. The most remarkable example in the district is the Stevens House at 315 North Washington Street, designed by prominent Syracuse-based architect Archimedes Russell for James Stevens, president of the Merchant Iron Works. This house inventively incorporates Richardsonian Romanesque details along with Queen Anne massing to create a unique concoction that retains a great deal of integrity despite its conversion to a new use.²⁹ The 1891 Olney House at 723 North Washington Street (home to a canning magnate, with a distinctive turret and oriel window) is more typical of the Queen Anne-style residences in this enclave, as is 119 Fort Stanwix Park. George Day, a local merchant, built his whimsical brick Queen Anne-style house at 701 North George Street in 1885. The Queen Anne-style houses appearing in the far west of the district, such as at 400 West Embargo Street and at 505 and 507 Madison Street along the streetcar line, are also examples of this trend.

Around the turn of the twentieth century, architectural fashion turned away from what came to be seen as the excesses of the Queen Anne in favor of more restrained styles, often drawing more directly on historical inspiration. Colonial Revival and Neoclassical-style houses are common in the district, with particularly notable examples at 901 North George Street (built for the Bailey family in 1900), 503 North George Street (designed by Nelson & Van Wagenen, c. 1916) and the William H. Doyle House at 900 North George Street (c. 1910-1914). The Tudor Revival was another historically inspired style in vogue at this time, exemplified by the home of Rome Copper & Brass executive Barton Haselton at 102 West Garden Street, built in 1905 and the brick house built for J. C. Carpenter on a generously sized lot at 308 West Bloomfield Street in 1923.

These and other mansions were generally situated on ample lots, particularly on elegant North George Street, which retains an impressive streetscape of high-style domestic architecture. Neighboring streets are characterized by more modest interpretations of these popular styles. Builders adopted practical and easily replicated house forms like the American Foursquare, bungalow, and simple two-story Colonial Revival, variations of which proliferated on streets to the east and west of North George Street in the northern portions of the district at this time (Figure 13). The development of these sections of the district reflects classic "streetcar suburb" style development, with narrow, deep lots lined by houses affordable for the growing middle class and accessible by expanding streetcar lines. The cluster of Four Square form houses on the small lots of Cherry Street illustrate this trend, as do houses along N. James Street and N. Madison Street south of West Linden Street and north of West Thomas Street, where the proximity of the streetcar line attracted middle-class families throughout the early twentieth century. Although less common than American Foursquare and Colonial Revival forms, bungalows appear in the district; notable examples include the houses at 205 Walnut Street and

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1102 and 1400 North Madison Street. The bungalows at 104 Maple Street and 117 West Locust Street are especially good examples of the Craftsman style.

As was the case nationwide, Rome experienced a construction slowdown in the 1930s-40s due to the impacts of the Great Depression followed by the national mobilization for World War II. In the nominated district, most new construction in the post-WWII era occurred on a relatively small number of undeveloped lots, which are mostly at the north end of the district. Postwar builders, following national trends, constructed houses that were inexpensive to build and reflected a more informal, car-oriented lifestyle, prioritizing relatively easy maintenance, privacy and modern conveniences. These forms are common in houses of this vintage within the district, even on the relatively large lots that were subdivided before the Depression. On North George Street from West Locust Street north to Oak Street, one- and one-and-one-half story houses are interspersed with older Colonial Revival-style houses built before the war. North of Oak Street the newer house forms predominate, including some that are slightly later split-level and post-war Colonial Revival examples. Characteristics such as lot size, front and side setbacks, materials, and street-facing orientation of the post-war houses are generally consistent with their older neighbors, lending an overall sense of continuity to the streetscape.

Rome posted its highest population at roughly 51,000 in 1960, then experienced overall population decline through the end of the twentieth century. By the 1960s, lots in the district were mostly built out, and residential developers in Rome increasingly focused on more modest, utilitarian housing nearer to Griffiss to accommodate its more transitory workforce. The city embarked on an ambitious and unusual Urban Renewal project in the late 1960s, partnering with the National Park Service to reconstruct Fort Stanwix; the Urban Renewal area also encompassed an area west of the 18-acre fort site, stretching from James Street west to Madison Street between the former canal right-of-way (Erie Boulevard West) to Liberty Street. This area, the heart of Rome's historic business district, was cleared and redeveloped as a pedestrian street. The district's period of significance ends with the start of construction on this project in 1970. The nominated district is located north of the Urban Renewal area and escaped the large-scale demolition that occurred there and retains integrity to the period of significance, with few major losses or other changes since the 1960s. Because of this stability, especially given the losses of historic fabric elsewhere in Rome, the nominated district records the history of Rome to an extent not seen elsewhere in the city's built environment.

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


Figure 1. Topographical Map of the Country between the Mohawk River and Wood Creek, From An Actual Survey taken in November 1758. This map shows Wood Creek at upper left, the Mohawk River in the lower right quadrant, Fort Stanwix (labeled with the letter C) and the smaller fort, built at opposite ends of the "Great Carrying Place" to protect the portage. Center for Brooklyn History Map Collections, https://mapcollections.brooklynhistory.org/.

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


Figure 2. Village of Rome in 1834, by the New York State Canal Commission. This map shows Dominick Street and James Street as the center of development, near the site of Fort Stanwix; the "Rome Canal" connecting the Mohawk River and Wood Creek runs south of Dominick Street where Erie Boulevard West is today. New York State Archives, A0848-77, Canal System Survey Maps, 1832-1843, Map no. E7-54, https://digitalcollections.archives.nysed.gov/index.php/Detail/objects/43713.

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


Figure 3. Original route of the Erie Canal, showing route south of Rome. *Map and Profile of the Erie Canal*, from *Laws of the State of New York, in relation to the Erie and Champlain Canals* (Albany: E. and E. Hosford, 1825). Available online at eriecanal.org/maps.html.

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


Figure 4. Rome in 1874. Note the Cemetery just north of the center of the image, which was on land donated by Dominick Lynch in 1823, and is now Fort Stanwix Park. This map also shows the Erie Canal in downtown Rome, and the Black River Canal extending northward.

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


Figure 5. In this 1858 map, the Black River Canal extends north from Rome to Carthage. *Map and Profiles of New-York State Canals, Designed Under Direction of Van Rensellaer Richmond, State Engineer & Surveyor, to Accompany his Report for 1858* (Albany: C. Benthuysen). Available online at eriecanal.org/maps.html.




Figure 7. Historic photograph of the carriage house behind 315 N. Washington Street, where Samuel B. Stevens stored his car collection. Chester Williams and Parker F. Scripture, *Photographs of Rome, New York 1880-1930 (Rome: Self-published, 1975), 65.*




Figure 9. Historic photograph of the Nock-Reid House, 211 West Embargo Street. Chester Williams and Parker F. Scripture, *Photographs of Rome, New York 1880-1930 (Rome: Self-published, 1975), 61.*




Figure 11. Historic photograph of the Comstock House, 513 North George Street (demolished). Chester Williams and Parker F. Scripture, *Photographs of Rome, New York 1880-1930 (Rome: Self-published, 1975), 63.*




Figure 13. This 1913 image of a funeral procession heading north on North George Street near Turin and Garden streets passed through a newly developed area where residents could build larger houses on more spacious lots than in the more densely developed part of town closer to downtown Rome. Chester Williams and Parker F. Scripture, *Photographs of Rome, New York 1880-1930* (Rome: Self-published, 1975), 41.










